GARDEN LOLLIPOP

A gorgeous native shrub occupies a corner It attracts little attention, however, until autumn when its sheds its leaves to reveal a delicate network of light grey branches smothered with bright reddish-orange berries. And when the autumn sun strikes the fruit laden branches, everyone takes notice. The shrub shines like a giant lollipop.

Often, when garden visitors discover that the big shrub is an Ozark native perfectly adapted to our climate, many head straight for an area nursery to purchase their own 'Warren's Red' Deciduous Hollv (Ilex decidua).

Lots of bird species also enjoy deciduous hollies. Mockingbirds and Robins pick away at the massive berry crop throughout fall and winter. Birds are particularly attracted to deciduous hollies during late winter when the fruit of many plant species has long been consumed.

Most hollies, evergreen and deciduous, are dioecious. While I'm not a fan of using formal botanical lingo outside of the classroom, it's probably justified when recommending hollies.

Dioecious simply refers to an interesting plant trait in which male (staminate) flowers and female (pistillate) flowers are borne on separate plants within a species. Hollies are either male or female. And here's the important point: only female holly plants bear fruit (berries).

Therefore, gardeners wanting lots of bright, shiny holly berries should always buy female holly cultivars. The "sex" of a nursery grown deciduous holly cultivar is typically printed on the label.

Perhaps you're wondering: "don't I need a of the Linnaeus Teaching Garden in Woodward Park. male holly for pollination?" With the aid of bees and wind, there usually is sufficient male deciduous holly pollen floating through urban neighborhoods to pollinate the females.



'Warren's Red' (Ilex decidua) is one of the best deciduous holly cultivars offered in the local nursery trade. Over time it forms a small graceful tree 15 to 20 feet in height with great form (limb structure). Berries are bright red and last late into the winter or until eaten by Cedar Wax Wings and Robins.

'Winter Red' Deciduous Holly (Ilex verticillata) also is a delightful deciduous holly for local gardens. It's a smaller multi-stem holly that grows 8 to 10 feet in height. It's a favorite of mine for mixed shrub borders.

Tulsa Garden Center schedules a vegetable seminar just in time to help you create a great spring and summer harvest.


Working Toward Veggie Perfection Saturday, March 17th, 9:30am
