Gardening by the Book

CACTI AND SUCCULENTS

The wonderful variety of size, shape, color and flower of these plants means everyone will find some that are fascinating and rewarding. With over 10,000 species worldwide, the beauty and versatility of these plants are no longer reserved for desert climates. Recent summer weather causes these to become a stronger consideration for local gardeners. It is possible to create a beautiful low-maintenance garden that requires minimal water.

For a comprehensive step-by-step guide to identification, care and cultivation, try The Complete Guide to Growing Cacti & Succulents (Lorenz Books, 2006). With over 400 varieties featured, botanical information on growth, spread, size and flowering is given. The section on care and cultivation provides step by step guidance on all aspects of buying, planting and maintaining the plants. With over 1000 full color photographs, the book also contains an extensive plant directory.

Another in the All Region Guide Series, Crazy about Cacti and Succulents (Brooklyn Botanic Garden, 2006) features chapters by noted horticulturists and master gardeners. Medicinal plants and succulent bonsai are included plus advice on how experts groom their plants for competition. Environmental information is given for cacti and succulents that are threatened with extinction.

Both beginners and experienced designers will find garden possibilities in Designing with Succulents (Timber Press, 2007). With over 300 color photographs, it gives design and cultivation basics for paths, borders, and containers. Hundreds of succulent plant

recommendations are offered with 90 easy-care, drought-tolerant companion plants.

Hardy Succulents (Storey Publishing, 2008) covers all aspects of their cultivation from groundcovers to shrubs. Practical tips on siting, plants, soil requirements, and care are included. The photographs of colorful flowering succulents use them as focal points in the garden. The book's step by step growing instructions, practical care tips and creative ideas for use will be informational for the reader.

Succulent Container Gardens (Timber Press, 2010) is a follow-up to Designing with Succulents. Author Debra Baldwin offers ideas for gardens from elegant to traditional and miniature to bonsai. Over 350 of the best succulents are described along with their companion plants. Easy to follow, expert tips explain overwintering, propagation and more. Usable suggestions for small space solutions, both indoors and out, are featured.

The Timber Press Guide to Succulent Plants of the World (Timber Press, 2011) begins with overview chapters on succulents in nature and in cultivation. Subsequent essay style chapters have full-color photos of the species specifying their geographical location and physical description. Reproductive characteristics, comparable species and pest susceptibilities contribute more in-depth information.

The Tulsa Orchid Society's regular monthly meeting is September 9th at 1:30 pm at the Garden Center. The guest speaker is *Carson E. Whitlow*, owner of Cypripedium Haven. He will give a 45 minute presentation, "The World of Cypripediums"

This presentation covers most of the native species in North/ Central America plus many of those from the rest of the world. These fascinating and often rare terrestrial orchids, also known as "Lady Slippers" are some of our most beautiful native wildflowers.

Mr. Carson Whitlow has been involved in growing and hybridizing orchids since the 1950's and has worked at some of the most prestigious orchid companies throughout his career. He became interested in native terrestrial orchids in the 1970's such as Calopogons and Cypripediums. His work with these genera of orchids resulted in the first registered artificial hybrids of Cypripedium in 1987 and Calopogon in 1991. He was also instrumental in the development of the internet site, "The Orchid Mall" a one stop place to browse for all things orchids from plants, potting supplies and Orchid shows and news.

Visitors and guests are always welcome, refreshments will be provided.
